Champions in both the men's and women's domestic 50-over competitions and a \$60 million funding commitment from the State and Federal Governments to redevelop the WACA Ground means there is much to celebrate from 2019-20, and a lot to look forward to in the years to come.

Before reflecting on the 2019-20 season, it would be remiss of us to not address the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic and the impact it has had at home and across the globe.

It has been a testing time for all West Australians as we come to terms with 'the new normal'. With an ongoing global pandemic, our immediate thoughts are with our WACA family – players, staff, affiliates, Members and supporters – and the impact the virus has had on their extended families.

As an organisation we are not immune to the financial tolls and some difficult decisions were made by our staff. Our team has worked incredibly hard to remodel our finances and restructure internally where necessary. Thankfully, strong governance and astute financial resourcing has the WACA well-placed to deal with forecasted falls in revenue across cricket in Australia.

In unique circumstances, we are prepared for the upcoming season and are well-positioned to bring domestic and international cricket to Optus Stadium and the WACA Ground, while continuing to grow the game in our own backyard. The iconic WACA Ground has long been the heart and soul of cricket in WA and we're excited to announce it will continue to be so for the years to come.

We were thrilled to receive the news in August that the State Government had committed to funding \$30 million towards the WACA Ground Improvement Project, in addition to the \$30 million committed by the Federal Government in December 2019.

Our vision to transform the WACA Ground into a sustainable community and sporting hub with cricket at its heart will now become a reality, thanks to the funding investment from the Federal and State Government and a further \$4 million from Cricket Australia.

The Project will have a strong community focus in addition to providing modern high-performance facilities, a multi-sport indoor facility and a ground suitable for other sports to complement Optus Stadium and activate the East Perth precinct.

As plans for the Project progress, the WA Cricket Foundation has turned its attention to the commitment to raise \$10 million

for the Project. The Foundation has finalised its strategy to raise much-needed funds for the Project and looks forward to launching the campaigns in the very near future.

While the Ground continues to thrive as a multi-purpose venue, hosting the likes of the Qantas Wallabies and Manchester United this year, the secured funding will enable the Ground to become a community space with wide-ranging benefits for all.

It was a momentous year for international cricket in WA, opening with the State's first ever day-night Test and concluding with a record-breaking women's T20 International. Drop-in wickets have, for two years in a row, drawn admiration from icons of the Test arena.

During the day-night Test match against trans-Tasman rivals New Zealand at Optus Stadium, the quality and character of the wicket received significant praise, with WA cricket legend, Adam Gilchrist, saying "Put the Perth deck on a truck and take it on a national tour!".

The WACA Ground hosted its first women's T20 International and set a new attendance record for a women's cricket match at the venue. A bumper crowd of 5,280 flocked to the iconic sporting venue to witness Australia claim their first win of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup tournament and India defeat Bangladesh in a thriller.

Nine of the 10 teams competing in the World Cup played at the Ground over a three-day festival of cricket, attracting nearly 10,000 vibrant and passionate fans. We are experiencing very healthy growth in social and club cricket numbers for women and girls, due largely to events like the World Cup that allow our future stars to see a strong pathway to the national level.

There was a significant shift for our teams as we retired the 'Warriors' and 'Fury' nicknames and returned to the WA Men's and Women's teams. This coincided with the return of the heritage emblem, a symbol of our pride to be Western Australia's team.

The WA Women's team claimed their first ever Women's National Cricket League title, with a historic win against the New South Wales Breakers. It was 33 years in the making, our first tournament win since the 1986-87 season under the previous Australian Women's Cricket Championship format. Congratulations to Nicole Bolton who was crowned Player of the Tournament and Player of the Final and skipper Chloe Piparo on her fantastic leadership.

The WA Men's team secured our second Marsh one-day domestic title in three seasons with a gripping four-wicket victory over Queensland. The triumph is WA's 14th in one-day domestic tournaments, the most of any state.

Shaun Marsh enjoyed a stellar season and was named Domestic Player of the Year and Player of the Match in the Marsh Cup Final. Remarkably, it was the first time in his 19-year career he's played every WA fixture in a season. It was also a breakout season with the bat for Cameron Green, he amassed three first-class centuries to show he is an exciting all-round prospect.

We again had a strong WA presence on the international stage, with 13 West Australians selected for Australia over the past 12 months in both men's and women's teams across all formats. Congratulations to Ashton Agar, Cameron Bancroft, Jason Behrendorff, Nicole Bolton, Nathan Coulter-Nile, Heather Graham, Mitch Marsh,

Shaun Marsh, Jhye Richardson, D'Arcy Short, Marcus Stoinis, Ashton Turner and Andrew Tye.

Their outstanding seasons are a true testament to the quality of our high-performance program, which is top ranked in the country.

A big change in personnel in our Perth Scorchers men's team saw fresh opportunity for emerging talent and allowed us to welcome in new faces. The team were disappointed to miss finals, but we have a strong core group of players and are confident of bouncing back next year.

Cricket for women and girls is thriving after the first standalone Women's Big Bash League tournament. The competition has generated great momentum and players like Nicole Bolton and Heather Graham are becoming household names within the Australian community.

Our WBBL side had an extremely strong campaign, which saw them make the semi-finals. At the end of the season we farewelled Meg Lanning, who has been immense for us as skipper over the past few years. We're already excited for our 2020 WBBL campaign, having signed Beth Mooney, the Player of the Tournament for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup, and the WBBL|05 Player of the Tournament Sophie Devine, who has also been named captain.

Community Cricket recorded the highest ever number of people playing cricket in our State, with WA leading the country in registered participation growth. This growth was led largely by a 45% increase in girls and women playing

cricket, as well as entry-level participation through the Woolworths Cricket Blast program.

There's been a focus on growing diversity in cricket and engaging with new partners to further develop our ties with these communities. The growth this year has been exceptional and wouldn't be possible without the help of our partners in this space including the Autism Association of WA, Inclusion Solutions, Healthway and the Insurance Commission of WA.

WA was again very well represented at the Cricket Australia 2019-20 Community Cricket Awards, with Wembley Districts JCC and Bassendean JCC both being recognised for their outstanding work in their local communities. Congratulations to both clubs!

Sadly, the sudden end to the season due to the pandemic meant we were unable to host the Laurie Sawle Medal event, which is always a fantastic evening of celebration and thanks. We wish to thank the Association's staff, players and volunteers for their tireless enthusiasm and hard work, especially during unprecedented times.

In difficult times, the WACA Board has shown great leadership and understanding as we reassess and adjust as needed. We thank them for their ongoing support and guidance as we continue to build the future of WA Cricket.

CHAIRS OF WACA EXECUTIVE / BOARD

The Executive was so named from 1907. Prior to this a 'WACA Committee' was essentially the Executive, but in the period 1890 to 1907 the Trustees of the Association played the major role in ground management. The Chairman of the Executive was also Chairman of the International Committee from its inauguration in 1922 until February 1990. Mr LM Sawle became its first separate Chairman in 1990, with Mr PB Rakich continuing as Chairman of the Executive. From 2004 the Executive is referred to as the Board.

It was back to the future for Western Australia in 2019-20, as a change of branding closer aligned with yesteryear produced history for both the men's and women's squads.

It was decided ahead of the season the WA State Cricket Teams would be referred to as the Western Australian Men's and Western Australian Women's teams, replacing the Western Warriors and the Western Fury 'nicknames'.

At the core of the change was representing all West Australians and getting back to the roots of our proud cricketing State by reinstating the heritage logo once synonymous with WA Cricket.

The crest worn proudly on the blazers of legends such as Dennis Lillee, Kim Hughes and John Inverarity, is now emblazoned on the shirts of our future stars Cam Green, Aaron Hardie and Georgia Wyllie.

The WA Women claimed their first ever Women's National Cricket League (WNCL) title, defeating the New South Wales Breakers in the final held in February.

It was the first time the WA Women had won a trophy since the 1986-87 season, when the competition was played under a different format.

The campaign was highlighted by two wins against New South Wales, who have had a stranglehold on the Ruth Preddy Cup with 21 of the previous 24 titles, and another against the highly admired Queensland Fire.

Nicole Bolton, named WNCL Player of the Season, was also named the Player of the Final with a cool-headed 67 to go with 3-34 with the ball.

Sheer elation surrounded what was truly a team celebration thanks to the presence of all squad members and WA Women's high-performance staff, who travelled to Sydney for the WNCL Final.

Reflecting after the final, Bolton said the win had been a long time coming for WA and began with a change in culture and belief off the field.

"The investment from the WACA over the last five years has been pivotal to making this happen," Bolton said.

"Lisa Keightley and Christina Matthews were central to the positive steps forward in WA Cricket and their hard work has given us the opportunity to earn and enjoy success."

It was a double dose of one-day silverware thanks to the WA Men's efforts in the Marsh Cup.

Forty-nine years after Tony Lock led WA to its first one-day domestic title against Queensland, Ashton Turner's men captured a record-extending 14th trophy against the same old foe.

Shaun Marsh, who was named Player of the Final with a fine 101 not out, was WA's talisman with the blade over the course of the tournament but was well supported throughout.

Nathan Coulter-Nile led the competition with 17 wickets that included a Player of the Match performance in a virtual semi-final against South Australia.



Sensational seasons from Nicole Bolton and Shaun Marsh saw the pair capture the Zoë Goss and Laurie Sawle Medals.

Marsh claimed his second successive Laurie Sawle Medal after a superb year of domestic cricket highlighted by a match-winning ton in Western Australia's Marsh One-Day Cup Final against Queensland.

Allrounder Nicole Bolton picked up her third Zoë Goss Medal, following a record-breaking domestic season that saw her claim the Women's National Cricket League Player of the Year award.

WA spinner Ashton Agar was awarded his first ever media-voted Gold Cup trophy following a strong season on the International stage, which featured his maiden five-wicket haul during the series in South Africa, and Australia's first T20 hattrick in 13 years.

Perth Scorchers speedster Jhye Richardson and England superstar Nat Sciver each came away with the Simon Katich and Scorchers WBBL Player of the Year awards respectively.

Richardson claimed 15 wickets and Sciver made 342 runs at an average of 38.00 and claimed six scalps.

Former Australian cricketer Karen Read was inducted into the WA Cricket Gallery of Greats.

Rising Star awards went to 21-year-old allrounder Aaron Hardie and talented batter Ashley Day who both had impressive debut seasons for the State.

WA bowler Kath Hempenstall took out the values-based Legacy Award, while Joel Paris was named winner of the Excalibur award.

When Shaun Marsh plays at his irresistible best, there are few better batsmen on the domestic stage. It would seem his peers agree, voting him the Australian Domestic Player of the Year for 2019-20.

A second consecutive Laurie Sawle Medal, underpinned by both the Western Australian Domestic One-Day and Four-Day Player of the Year awards, ensured this season was once again the 'Summer of SOS'.

Nearly two decades on from his first-class debut, Marsh's domestic career is enjoying an Indian summer of its own and shows no signs of slowing.

The golden moment of a glistening 2019-20 season was undoubtably his match-winning ton in WA's Marsh One-Day Cup Final against Queensland.

The elegant left-hander, who scored 389 runs at 55.57 across the competition, struck an unbeaten 101 to steer WA to a record 14th one-day domestic trophy. One could argue it was history repeating itself – some 30 years earlier his father Geoff piloted WA to its eighth one-day domestic trophy with an unbeaten 91 in a Player of the Match performance of his own.

Reflecting on the Marsh Cup win, a typically humble Marsh said his enjoyment of seeing team success outweighed the individual accolades that followed.

"It was nice to play well and win awards, but for me it's all about winning trophies as a team. To see everyone so happy after the final and to share that moment with your teammates, that's why you play cricket," he said.

"We had played great cricket right throughout the tournament, so to finish it off like that was very rewarding for the group."

At the time, coach Adam Voges described it as one of the best performances of Marsh's career, high praise from a man who has spent many a summer alongside the 37-year-old.

"An innings like that comes from someone who has played a lot of cricket and understands their game incredibly well," Voges said.

The veteran also led WA's run scoring in the Marsh Sheffield Shield, amassing 724 runs at 48.26, including an equal career best 214 against Victoria.

Marsh admits that while there is some sadness in acknowledging his international career may be behind him, he revelled in the opportunity to play every WA Sheffield Shield match, the first time he's done so since the 2014-15 season.

"On one side it was sad knowing that I probably wasn't going to play cricket for Australia again, but on the flipside, it took away the extra expectation and allowed me to focus on playing well for WA," Marsh said.

For Voges, it meant having a man with over 10,000 first-class runs provide the bedrock for the WA innings at first drop, a luxury the coach relished.

"It certainly helps that we have an experienced and reliable performer who can walk out for us at number three in every game of the season and we know what we're going to get," Voges said.

Next year Marsh will embark on a record-setting 20th domestic season for WA and is set to surpass all but the legendary Justin Langer on the list of the State's greatest run-scorers across all formats.

Naturally, Marsh's reaction is less of the legacy he has built

"When I started playing, I had all these legends of the game around me in Tom Moody, Justin Langer, Simon Katich and Murray Goodwin. I know how it feels to have a senior figure in the team and that's where I'm at in my career now."

With the lure of breaking a 21-year Sheffield Shield drought driving the Men's program, Voges hopes Marsh's domestic dominance will continue for a while yet.

Three Zoë Goss Medals and more runs plundered for WA than any other woman may be a childhood dream for most, but for Nicole Bolton cricket hasn't always been a fairy tale.

"It's been a bit of journey," a pensive Nicole Bolton muses as she gazes out over the WACA Ground she debuted on as a 16-year-old in 2005.

Thrust into the state team as a generational talent, Bolton was named WA captain at 23.

As a cricketer, she admits the captaincy probably came a little early.

As a person, she is adamant it was premature.

"My mentality at the time was that my talent was going to take me wherever I wanted to go," she said.

"More than that, I was a bit soft and my attitude was short of what was required, I didn't like authority or being told what to do."

A perfectionist with a desire to achieve on any given day, Bolton became consumed by her on-field performances and says a failure on the field would often spill into life away from cricket.

"For a long time, how I felt about myself correlated to how many runs I scored, and it was having a detrimental effect on my mental state," she said.

At the end of 2018 Bolton stepped away from cricket for a second time, re-inventing herself as a person and taking time to assess her future in the game.

"I was very open to retiring from cricket," she said.

"I took my time making a decision and realised that my passion was still very much cricket and I still had things I wanted to achieve in the game."

Bolton's return to playing cricket was careful. She declined an offer to join Australian teammates in Perth for the ODI series against New Zealand and instead chose to reintegrate through grade cricket with Subiaco-Floreat.

It turned to be a masterstroke decision, as a successful return to club cricket became Bolton's springboard into one of the most destructive Women's National Cricket League (WNCL) seasons in recent memory.

Through nine matches she struck a competition-high 436 runs at 48.44, 71 runs clear of next-best Chloe Piparo (365).

She was just as ruthless with the ball; her 16 scalps at 19.43 apiece trailed only New South Wales' Rene Farrell (21) and teammate Emma King (18).

Having spent her entire professional career opening the batting, Bolton's return to cricket coincided with a shift to number four on the team sheet to bring some stability to the middle order.

WA Women's Assistant Coach Michael Dighton says her openness to the batting move showed her willingness to have a team-first mentality.

"The way she embraced the role is something she did outstandingly well," he said.

"Her leadership, particularly in the WNCL Final, and the help she provided Chloe Piparo as a young captain throughout the season was exceptional." It's those leadership qualities that Bolton has carefully crafted, aware of her standing in the team and the importance of nurturing future talent.

With the understanding that younger players may be intimidated stepping into the WA team, Bolton sees herself as perfectly placed to help guide new and emerging talent.

"I'm always trying to be a positive leader; I'm strongly motivated to have an impact on the next generation coming through," she said.

"I've been working hard to develop authentic personal relationships rather than just from a cricketing perspective.

"I don't feel I have to lead in an official capacity, as my actions around the group will help drive the culture."

After prophetically declaring in 2018 that this playing group was capable of breaking WA's 24-year WNCL title drought, Bolton says victory couldn't have tasted sweeter.

"We have worked so hard to develop a culture when we haven't necessarily had the results we wanted," she said.

"This year we had close games and different players performed at different times to get the team over the line, it shows great development as a group, we're not reliant on one or two players."

Ironically, one of the best natural talents WA has produced believes her magnificent season is a triumph of mental application and the power of positivity.


"As I've matured, I've learned about attitude, mindset and what it actually takes to have prolonged success," she said.

"How I trained was pivotal in the success I had on the field. The volume had always been there but there was a renewed focus on my application and patience."

With the ICC Women's World Cup on the horizon, Bolton will be hoping for a national recall off the back of her domestic form.

"One-day cricket is where I've had most of my success and I feel like I've shown flexibility this season, batting at number four has been very beneficial for me."

- · Retention of the WACA scoreboard.
- Provision of a new working facilities for WACA employees.
- Lecture theatre and multi-purpose meeting rooms, that will be made available for community use.
- Provision of space to provide for medical and sports science services currently lacking in the East Perth precinct.
- Café and new pavilion, including food and beverage outlets and a multi-purpose function room.

This vision closely aligns with the efforts the WACA is currently undertaking to build the profile of the WACA Ground as not only the home of cricket in WA, but a versatile venue with a strong community focus.

In December 2019, the WACA marked a major step forward in achieving this vision when it welcomed a \$30 million funding commitment from the Federal Government towards the WACA Ground Improvement Project.

The WACA's vision for the Ground is now set to become a reality with the State Government announcing that they would also commit \$30 million towards the Project in August this year.

The WACA remains committed to raising another \$10 million towards the Project through the WA Cricket Foundation, in addition to the \$4 million funding commitment from Cricket Australia that has been secured. Excitingly, the

WACA has been presented with an opportunity to partner with the City of Perth to explore the feasibility of an aquatic facility at the Ground. The WACA is currently in the process of

determining if a 50-metre pool, a learn to swim pool and a leisure slide can be integrated into the facility's design. There are of course several complex matters that need to be determined, including management, an appropriate operating model and tenure before an informed decision can be made. However, the WACA is thrilled to be working closely with the City of Perth to enliven and improve the East Perth precinct.

Despite the uncertainty the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic has created, the WACA remains steadfast in its vision to create a sustainable community and sporting hub and has utilised this year to determine how this vision will be achieved.

The WACA is grateful to both the State and Federal Government for supporting the Project and for the budding partnership with the City of Perth. The WACA thanks the State Government, in particular, the Minister for Sport and Recreation, the Hon. Mick Murray MLA and the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries who provided ongoing support during the development of the Project.

The move of men's international and Big Bash League matches to Optus Stadium in the 2018-2019 cricket season paved the way for the WACA Ground to get some runs on the board as Perth's most versatile event venue. Since this move, the venue has established its own catering service and now offers a diverse range of function rooms and outdoor spaces for events.

The WACA Ground will always be the home of cricket in WA and continues to host Marsh Sheffield Shield and One-Day Cup matches, women's one-day and T20 Internationals, WBBL matches, WNCL matches, Futures League and Premier Cricket finals to name a few. However, the opportunity to diversify what the Ground can offer as an event space will increase revenue opportunities that will ultimately ensure a sustainable future for cricket in WA. Last year saw more than 14,000 people come through the gates to attend non-cricket events.

Last July the Ground transformed into a training venue for Premier League legends Manchester United as they prepared for their Optus Stadium matches against Perth Glory and Leeds United. The following month the hallowed turf was readied for the Qantas Wallabies training camp

and just one month later Crusty Demons, a group of daredevil freestyle motorcyclists, were displaying their skills in front of a strong crowd.

Earlier this year, the WACA Ground proudly hosted nine training sessions and five matches across three days as part of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup. Almost 5,000 fans attended to watch Australia beat Sri Lanka in a nail-biting match on 24 February 2020.

As part of the preparations for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup a new set of all-gender changerooms were installed into the Lillie-Marsh stand. Importantly, following these matches, the additional set of change rooms are now available for a range of community and sporting events.

The WACA is grateful to the WA Government as funding provided through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries CSRFF Small Grants Fund has allowed for the installation of these changerooms.

There is no doubt the WACA Ground is a much-loved and iconic WA venue. The WACA will continue to grow and diversify the offering at the Ground as it strives to become not only the home of cricket in WA, but a community destination with year-round events.

A record-extending 14th domestic one-day title meant there was plenty to celebrate after the 2019-20 season for the WA Men's team.





Limited-overs cricket has always been a happy hunting ground for WA teams, so we were thrilled to add another trophy to the cabinet with victory in the Marsh Cup Final over Queensland.

A clear hunger was present amongst the group ahead of the tournament, largely due to a sense of unfinished

business from the previous campaign where we exited in the semi-finals, having gone undefeated in the group stage.

We went with a more experienced team in the Marsh Cup and that was undoubtably reflected in both the results and the even spread of contributors we had across the competition.

Of our five wins, three were by less than 10 runs and two of those wins were in rain-affected games. In those situations, you need experienced players who can stay in the moment and execute under pressure when the game is on the line.

It's no surprise that our best players in those moments were the guys who have performed at the highest level. Marcus Stoinis' (3-20) death-bowling against Victoria was exceptional, Shaun Marsh (82) helped us to a defendable total against New South Wales, and a perfectly executed Jhye Richardson yorker ripped the game from Callum Ferguson and sent us into the final.

A couple of crushing 100-plus run wins at home was the perfect way to start our campaign. Stoinis blitzed 101* off

just 58 balls and Cameron Bancroft made 78 as we sailed to 8-386 against Victoria. D'Arcy Short did similar against Tasmania with a commanding 129 and was backed up in the field by Richardson (3-23) and Andrew Tye (3-49).

Across the entire tournament Nathan Coulter-Nile and Richardson were excellent with the new ball and often struck early; this sets you up in one-day cricket. Stoinis was instrumental in pivotal moments and Bancroft showed his leadership and adaptability, playing a variety of batting roles.

Perhaps the most mature knock of the tournament came from a man playing in just his eighth List A match. Coming in with the score at 5-73 in a virtual semi-final against South Australia, Cameron Green's 86 from 78 balls grafted us to 252. It proved to be enough, as Coulter-Nile (5-48) led the attack that bowled us into the final against Queensland.

Shaun Marsh was reliable once again throughout the campaign, scoring 389 runs at 55.57. He saved his best innings for when it mattered most, scoring a brilliant hundred in the final to get us over the line. It capped a consistent tournament for Shaun, and he was aptly named 'Player of the Match'.

In a sense, our Sheffield Shield competition was a tale of two halves, split either side of the BBL break. In the first half of the season we played strong cricket with both talent and toughness. The second half was a different story and wasn't what we had planned or hoped for. It was a great opportunity to play our first two fixtures at home, winning at the WACA Ground is something we certainly focus on. The goal is always to make our opposition feel like WA is a hard place to come and play.

While we would have liked a better result than a draw against Tasmania, two early home wins against Victoria and South Australia highlighted our ability to play positive cricket at home. To beat a strong Victorian side in such emphatic fashion was a great sign for our group.

Jhye Richardson bowled beautifully early in the season and was backed up by Matt Kelly who continues to become a reliable wicket taker. Shaun Marsh's first three games at the WACA Ground showed all his class and experience, he averaged 112.75 and scored a brilliant 214 in our nine-wicket win over Victoria.

We also showed the mental toughness required to bat under pressure and hold on for a draw when playing from a long way behind the game. In our second innings against Queensland at the Gabba we were 7-53, still 23 runs shy of the first innings deficit, but batted a further 64 overs to force a draw.

For many, that game will be remembered as the moment Cameron Green announced himself as a genuine all-round talent. He'd previously performed well with the ball and as much as we knew internally of his ability with the bat, he was yet to show it at first-class level. His 87 not out in the first innings was impressive, but his 121 not out batting at number nine in the second innings was sublime.

For a young player to stand up in a pressure situation and show that level of maturity was a terrific effort. It was the catalyst for a breakout season, as he went on to score a further two tons to finish the year with 699 runs at an average of 63.54.

Having beaten Victoria so convincingly at home, it was disappointing that the return fixture turned out to be the anomaly of the season. The match was called off after only 40 overs, with the MCG pitch deemed unsafe for batting. When top order players are continuously hit on the body and head two or three times an over from balls misbehaving off a good length you know things are not quite right.

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Despite sharing the points for a nil result in Melbourne, we went into the BBL break second on the ladder and feeling positive about our performances. We'd played well, with only one loss coming against a full strength New South Wales in Sydney.

Unfortunately, the second half of the season wasn't as promising as the first. A dearth of senior players meant there was a steep learning curve for our younger players.

Mitch Marsh, Ashton Turner, Cameron Bancroft and Hilton Cartwright were all out of the side through either injury or performance. In an ideal world, senior players are fit and performing well, but we didn't get that this year. There is no doubt those boys will be hungry to atone next season.

Missing senior players naturally impacts your overall performance and while the collective results tapered, it was clear that there is plenty of talent emerging in our squad. Allrounder Aaron Hardie, who has only played three first-class games, scored a century in the final match against Queensland to back up his eight wickets on debut at the end of last season. Josh Inglis and Josh Phillipe showed good signs, while Jake Carder earned his opportunity at the top of the order.

With an abrupt end to the season due to the global Coronavirus pandemic, we finished fifth on the Sheffield Shield ladder, but for a lot of the season it certainly didn't feel like that.

Ultimately, to end the season with one of the two state-based trophies up for grabs, makes it a year with success, but not entirely fulfilled. To see 11 players selected for international cricket is again an endorsement of the strength of our WA program. It wouldn't be a surprise if a few more get their opportunity over the next 12 months.

We continue to be committed to developing adaptable and resilient cricketers and people to help take

For a club with a proud history of making and winning finals, to miss out for a second consecutive season was certainly disappointing.





Leading into the season, we had significant personnel changes with several of our veterans accepting opportunities to play elsewhere, while Maxy Klinger retired after a remarkable career.

We also welcomed two new overseas

players, Englishmen Liam Livingstone and Chris Jordan, while Fawad Ahmed and Kurtis Patterson joined us from the Sydney Thunder.

With such a high amount of player turnover, you can look at it two ways. It was disappointing for us to lose some of our more experienced players, but at the same time it provided an opportunity for new talent to emerge.

A younger playing list and a slight change in our game style meant it took us a little while to adapt. The pleasing part was that our best cricket was certainly good enough to challenge any team on the day. The challenge for our group is to be able to do this more consistently.

Mitch Marsh led from the front and was a consistent performer for us. His 93 not out against the Brisbane Heat was some of the most destructive hitting seen at Optus Stadium.

Chris Jordan brought much-needed experience to our bowling attack and was a great help to Mitch on the field.

His leadership was just as valuable as the wickets he took, as he ended up our equal leading wicket-taker. He also displayed his athleticism in the field, his diving catch at long-on in our win against the Melbourne Renegades at home was one of the best in the tournament.

For Josh Inglis it was a breakout season. We gave him an extended run opening the batting, for him to make the most of the opportunity and establish himself there was pleasing to see. His partnership with Liam Livingstone at the top of the order proved to be a real positive. With three opening stands over 100 runs, we often got away to a flying start.

Fawad Ahmed too did a great job as a wicket-taker and controlling the middle overs with the ball, his work in unison with Ashton Agar was another positive for us.

Jhye Richardson improved with every game. Given the task of taking the new ball and leading our attack, he continues to impress for a young man who is still only 23 years old.

We were also able to get several games into some of our younger players such as Cameron Green. For these guys to experience the pressures of BBL cricket will no doubt continue their learning and development.

Frustratingly, there were some missed opportunities throughout the tournament.

The difference between our eventual sixth place in BBL|09 and a finals appearance came down to defending a rain-adjusted total as a storm rolled in during our Australia Day match in Western Sydney.

On a slow dry pitch and with no guarantee of the storm coming in, we chose to bat with the mindset that runs on the board would always be the right tactic. It came down to Sydney Thunder's Chris Morris hitting a six to get them home, but with such fine margins within the game, there could have been a very different finish.

The Adelaide Strikers game is another one we look back on and rue 'what could have been'. Chasing 199, we were 0-124 through 8.3 overs before losing both openers in consecutive balls. After such a great start we were unable to put another partnership together and came up short. To not get the job done there was very disappointing.

It's worth noting that Jason Behrendorff and Andrew Tye both missed the entire tournament with injury. Losing two

of your most experienced bowlers just before a tournament starts is never ideal. To have those guys back next season will be akin to having two new signings.

Reflecting over the whole campaign, there were moments we were at our best and showed we can challenge and compete with any other team. The overriding factor is we didn't do that enough.

Consistency starts with being hard to beat at home and that is something we haven't quite achieved yet at Optus Stadium, but are determined to do so. The incredible level of support we get from Members and fans at home is rarely matched across the league, so the challenge for us it to back it up on the field.

We're excited about the group we have, and we'll be looking to keep the majority together as we continue to build a Scorchers squad that WA can be proud of.

New branding, a new attitude and a new addition to the trophy cabinet made the 2019-20 Women's National Cricket League a resounding success for the Western Australian Women's cricket team.





To break a 24-year WNCL hoodoo and win our first ever title was an incredible achievement for everyone involved within the program. For context, it was the first time the WA women had won a tournament since 1986-87 under the previous Australian Women's Cricket Championship format.

What we were able to accomplish is something the players are particularly proud of, and with good reason. In recent times we have been working hard for not much success, so to have that reward for effort is satisfying.

Perhaps even more satisfying is the way it was earned, with two wins against the dominant New South Wales Breakers and another against the talented Queensland Fire.

The WNCL is played either side of the WBBL, so with the season broken into two parts there is an opportunity to set strong short-term goals and focusses, which is something we did particularly well this year.

It was a slightly different format this season as the competition stretched from six to eight games, with the top two teams at the end of the round-robin playing each other in the final. I think everyone was happy with the opportunity to play more cricket, but the extended fixture also lent itself to a truer table; one bad day didn't necessarily cruel your chances of a top-two finish as it had done in previous years.

At the start of every season, you always aim to play in the final regardless of your previous finish or the strength of the other teams and the goal was the same this year.

When I reflect on the season, the two-game block we had in Queensland to begin the season had a massive bearing on our approach upon returning from WBBL commitments. We went to Queensland with a few injury concerns but had a positive mindset and we managed two hard fought wins, which was the perfect start to the season.

In our first game against Queensland we chased 189, thanks largely to a 156-run partnership between Chloe Piparo (76) and Nicole Bolton (77). At 2-12 it looked a long chase but the composure and maturity they both batted with was impressive. Taneale Peschel (3-48) began strongly up front by bowling both Kirby Short and Grace Harris with two outstanding deliveries. It was a fantastic result and set the tone for the season, especially against a strong Queensland team that has a core group of players who double-up in the WBBL for Brisbane Heat and play a lot of cricket together.

A day later we defended 194 against Tasmania with Nicole Bolton again leading the charge with 63 and 2-26. Two Player of the Match performances in two days set the tone for her season as well, which thankfully continued all the way through to the final. A special mention to Sophie Devine who plucked a caught and bowled off her boot laces when it looked like Tasmania had the chase under control. That effort, combined with two brilliant run outs, ensured the victory.

From my perspective the matches in Queensland were a confirmation of confidence, we believed we could play to that level, but until you physically go out there and perform there is always an element of doubt, especially against the great teams.

From there we only dropped two games for the rest of the season. Pleasingly, there were contributions from everyone throughout the season. Highlights included a match-winning hundred from Sophie Devine against Victoria while Emma King bowled consistently well to lead our wicket taking with 18.

The undoubted star of the tournament was Nicole Bolton who shifted down the order to the position of number four, having previously opened the batting for most of her career. The quintessential Western Australian cricketer, Bolton is competitive in all three facets and was a deserved Player of the Tournament.

Oddly enough, we played New South Wales in our final two matches, once to get into the final and then a rematch 10 days later. Everyone knows how dominant NSW has been over the past 20 years, so there are some mental demons to overcome when you play against them.

We won the first contest against them under considerable pressure, chasing 223 and getting into a bit of trouble during the run chase. Piparo (51) and Bolton (53) had put us in a great position, but at 4-132 and with both batters back in the pavilion, there was still a mountain of work to be done. The 74-run partnership between Megan Banting (57*) and Mathilda Carmichael (26) got us over the line and was instrumental in giving us the belief that we could beat them in the final.

It was far from a fait accompli, as we had to wait on the result between Queensland and South Australia to confirm our spot in the final. Fortunately for us, the match was washed out without a ball being bowled and we were into our second final in three seasons.

We started nervously having won the toss and decided to bat first and after three overs were in trouble at 2-8. As she had done all year, Bolton (67) dug us out of a hole and was strongly supported by Ashley Day (32) and some other strong middle order contributors to give us a competitive total of 231.

Our spinners, Bolton and Emma King, were outstanding with the ball and created enough opportunities for us to win the game. The celebrations went long into the night and were made even more memorable by the presence of all squad members and WACA Women's high performance staff, thanks to the generosity of WACA CEO Christina Matthews and High Performance Manager Kade Harvey.

To see the look of pride and satisfaction on the face of our assistant coach and WA cricket legend Zoë Goss during the night reinforced the fact that we had achieved something special.

The hallmark of this season was when we did get into trouble during a game, someone always stood up and dug us out of the hole. In all sports, if you absorb the pressure, win the critical moments and deal with adversity in games, most of the time you will come out on top. Chloe Piparo as a young captain and leader was inspirational.

It was fitting to see Bolton named Player of the Final following a sublime season. A composed, experienced and ultimately highly impactful allrounder, it truly was her tournament.

Personally, I would like to thank the WACA for its support over the season and to Lisa Keightley in particular, who had coached the team since 2015 before departing in December after the WBBL to take up a role as the head coach of the England Women's cricket team. Her dedication and hard work over the years enabled the players to achieve the ultimate success. I felt fortunate to be afforded the opportunity to coach for the remainder of the season in a caretaker capacity and am proud of the way the team transitioned and continued to perform despite the off-field changes.

Finally, to all the WA Women's high performance staff who supported me and the team throughout the campaign, I can't thank you enough. I hope that you will look back on season 2019-20 with great fondness and special memories.

As is now the case with the shortest format, there was a lot of player movement in the lead up to the season. We were thrilled to welcome back England international Nat Sciver as an overseas marquee, who returned having missed the previous season.

Alongside the contracted Amy Jones, Ireland's Kim Garth was our final overseas marquee signing, replacing Kate Cross from the previous campaign.

We also welcomed Georgia Redmayne and Jemma Barsby to the Scorchers, who moved across from Hobart Hurricanes and Brisbane Heat respectively.

Elyse Villani, an inaugural member and former captain of the Scorchers who had given us four years of fantastic service, moved back to her native Melbourne.

Having missed the finals for the first time in our history in WBBL|04, we were eager to bounce back quickly and re-establish ourselves as a proud team that performed to a high standard.

From a broader perspective, the season should be viewed as a success. During the home and away rounds we won nine of our 14 games, our most ever, and won ourselves the opportunity to play in finals after finishing third on the table.

Our season started with a tricky three-match road trip through Melbourne and Brisbane, taking on the Renegades, Heat and Adelaide Strikers – a tough draw no matter which way you spin it!

We lost our opener to the Renegades but bounced back to comfortably beat the Heat by nine wickets on their home deck. Chasing 146, overseas marquee Amy Jones produced a Player of the Match performance with an unbeaten 60 and was supported by skipper Meg Lanning's 56.

It would be a sign of things to come, with the opening partnership of Jones and Lanning becoming an imposing first-wicket partnership. Across the 12 matches the pair walked out to open the innings together, the average partnership was 53.6.

We were 3-3 through our first six matches, a strong start considering five of our six games were against eventual finalists and four were away from home. More encouragingly, we had multiple players contributing and showing strong form. Jones and Lanning had passed 40 four times each, while Garth and Nat Sciver were having an impact as overseas marguees.

We played out a nail-biter against the Strikers, setting the Melbourne Stars 135 thanks largely to Jones (80) and Lanning (64). With 11 required to win from the last over of the day, Heather Graham (0-35) held her nerve to get the team home by two runs.

The biggest disappointment to come from our opening phase of matches was Piepa Cleary, who was ruled out of the remainder of the tournament with a leg fracture in the 20-run loss at the WACA Ground against the Stars.

Consistent performances helped us win five of our next six matches to all but confirm a return to the WBBL Finals.

The run featured dominant wins with equally dominant performances, the highlight being a nine-wicket win over the Stars underscored by a franchise record 147-run opening stand from Jones and Lanning.

Sciver continued her strong form with the bat in wins over the Sydney Sixers and Thunder, while Heather Graham and Samantha Betts performed well with the ball.

The final two matches of the regular season saw us split wins in a double-header with the Hobart Hurricanes. Lanning scored our only century for the tournament with a superb 101 in a 35-run win. Taneale Peschel came into the side for the first time and performed well, taking 2-33 and 2-22 to lead the attack in both games.

It was disappointing to lose the semi-final, but the reality is we came up against a pretty red-hot Strikers team. Nat Sciver and Amy Jones were both recalled for international duty with England, which hurt our chances.

Unfortunately, that's how franchise cricket works. You want to bring in the best players you can, but sometimes you do so understanding that they may not be there for the business end.

We still had a very good team going into that semi-final, but we were a little light on runs and missed a couple of opportunities in the field.

In terms of individual performers, we had two clear stand outs. Meg Lanning had an outstanding season, she is one of the best batters in the world and often plays match-winning innings. Nat Sciver had an incredible season for us and was our Player of the Tournament.

The amount of support we received from our Members and fans throughout the year was immense. We loved the opportunity to play standalone matches and thank all who came along to support. We're excited to try and take it a game further next year!

Amid impressive individual performances, the season highlight was without doubt the final-ball thriller which saw WA secure the Cricket Australia Under-17 National Championships in Mackay.

MALE

It was a strong season for Western Australia in Cricket Australia's Toyota Second XI Competition with eight wins and a draw from 11 fixtures, to finish second on the overall table to Queensland.

Jake Carder led the competition in run-scoring with 581 at 48.42, thanks largely to a sublime 232 against Tasmania that propelled him to the top of the order in the Marsh Sheffield Shield. In the same innings, Hilton Cartwright belted 32 boundaries on his way to 235, reminding state selectors he is still a force to be reckoned with on the domestic stage. Liam Guthrie led the WA wicket-taking with 12 from four games, while Josh Nicholas picked up 10 wickets from two appearances.

Aaron Hardie and Liam O'Connor both made their List A debuts during WA's successful Marsh Cup campaign, while strong club form saw Jaron Morgan debut for the Perth Scorchers against the Melbourne Stars in the KFC Big Bash League in January.

West Australians Sam Fanning and Cooper Connolly were both selected to represent Australia at the ICC Under-19 Cricket World Cup 2020 held in South Africa. Fanning was prominent at the top of the Australian order and scored a team-high 236 runs at 59, with a best of 75 against India in Potchefstroom.

Connolly's World Cup selection capped a remarkable summer of cricket for the 16-year-old. From two opportunities at the tournament, he showed his talent with a quick-fire 64 from 53 deliveries against the West Indies.

The launchpad for his meteoric rise through the under-age ranks this season began at the Cricket Australia Under-17 National Championships in October, where he was named Player of the Tournament and Player of the Final in a victorious WA team.

The undefeated Under 17s snatched victory in a nail-biting finish against New South Wales Metro, ultimately winning by a single run. A dramatic final two overs from Nathan Bothma and Hayden Stumpers saw three NSW Metro wickets fall for five runs, handing WA victory by the narrowest of margins.

Sharad Jessani bowled well for his 12 wickets for the tournament, while Blair Walsh scored a fine 108 against Queensland. Wicket-keeper Riley Mattingley was the winner of the Fielding Award with six catches and four stumpings.

Leading the side, Connolly finished the tournament with 264 runs at 66 (third overall) and 14 wickets (second overall). That earned him selection into the CA XI team that played in the Cricket Australia Under-19 National Championships in Perth, where he scored 396 runs at 66 against the older opposition, as well as taking eight wickets with his spin bowling.

It was a disappointing tournament for WA who finished eighth overall. Captain Damien Burrage and Caiden Eaton led the attack for the State with eight wickets each, while Jayden Goodwin topped the run-scoring with 307 runs at 38.38. The standout innings for WA was by World Cup-bound Sam Fanning, who scored a century in the final match against Queensland.

At the Cricket Australia Under-15 National Championships in Ballarat, WA won three out of six matches to finish seventh on the ladder. Corey Wasley scored a century against Victoria Country and was in the top-five leading run-scorers for the tournament with 237 runs at 47.40. At the conclusion of the carnival Wasley and Benji Melville were both selected in the Cricket Australia Under-15 talent squad.

FEMALE

Tasmania hosted the Cricket Australia Under-18 National Championships in October. The Western Australian team again displayed progress from the previous year, with three victories in the T20 format and two in the 50-over fixtures. Jacqueline Naidoo was the leading wicket-taker for the tournament with 17 wickets at 12.53. She was ably supported by the economical Charis Bekker, who took 13 wickets at just over eight apiece.

Georgia Wyllie showed her batting talent with 222 runs at 24.67, while Molly Healy compiled 138 at 46 from four matches. Millie Monaghan was again an impressive all-round contributor, with four wickets and 92 runs to go alongside seven catches and a runout.

It was a tough tournament for WA at the Cricket Australia Under-15 Female National Championships in Canberra. Despite a disappointing campaign with only two wins from eight games, there were some encouraging individual performances.

Chloe Ainsworth compiled 190 runs at of 27.10 to finish in the top five run-scorers for the tournament. The budding allrounder was just as effective in the field, with nine wickets, five catches and a run out.

Shay Malonini showed great promise with the ball; she took nine wickets at 13.78, including a match winning 3-16 in the final match against Tasmania.

Both Chloe Ainsworth and Sienna Ryan were selected in the Cricket Australia Under-15 squad at the conclusion of the tournament.

Pleasingly, four WA bowlers took seven or more wickets across the tournament, the same number as eventual winners NSW Metro, with an even spread of contributors putting WA in good stead for future tournaments.

Western Australia is leading the country in registered cricket participation growth, with women and girls the fastest growing area, following the official release of the 2019-20 Australian Cricket Census.

It is an exciting time for WA Cricket as the State saw an increase of 12.6% in registered participation, exceeding the national average of 3.8%.

In its second year, the successful delivery of the 2019-20 Woolworths Cricket Blast program played a fundamental role in introducing a record 7,500 kids to cricket in WA, a 12.2% increase on the previous season.

It was great to see an increase in the number of female players in WA, with continued growth in junior girls' cricket along with booming success in the Perth Scorchers Women's League (PSWL).

In schools, almost 14.4% more students experienced cricket programs, which is an important first step to getting kids excited about moving to community cricket.

Senior community cricket also had a great year with growth for the first time in a number of years. Overall 8.6% more players registered to play senior community cricket across the State.

More clubs than ever before engaged and ran programs that were accessible to people with a disability. Aboriginal kids and adults and multicultural populations, with the diversity of WA Cricket growing by 16%. Wembley Districts JCC was an outstanding example of how clubs can provide

a welcoming and inclusive environment, especially for people living with a disability. The Club was awarded the 2020 Cricket Australia Community Cricket Club of the Year for its work in developing a complete pathway for players with a disability from the age of five through to the Belt up Senior Integrated League.

This growth has been underpinned by the innovative solutions and support the WACA has been able to offer clubs through its strong partnerships with Autism Association of WA, Inclusion Solutions, Healthway and the Insurance Commission of WA.

To help achieve these great results for WA Cricket, the WACA's community cricket team continued to prioritise support of and engagement with key stakeholders, schools, clubs and associations to strive to grow the game in a healthy and sustainable way. These thousands of volunteers, School Ambassadors and other stakeholders make up the fabric of community cricket in WA and their commitment and work is so important and appreciated.

FEMALE CRICKET

Female players increased to 5,800, up a remarkable 45% on last season due to an increase in junior girls of 8.5% and an explosion in senior women's cricket with an unprecedented

The WACA and the Insurance Commission partnered this year to promote the Belt Up campaign, which encourages motorists to always wear a seatbelt to lessen the severity of injury.

Ninety-five (95) people were killed or seriously injured on WA roads last year while not wearing a seatbelt. Young men in regional areas remain overrepresented in vehicle crash and injury statistics.

Through the WACA's high participation rates in metro and regional areas, strong player networks and ties to the local community, the Belt Up message is communicated to raise public awareness at a grass-roots level.

Much like belting up, wearing a helmet out on the field significantly reduces the occurrence of head injuries during a game. In a bid to create safer environments for players, the Insurance Commission will provide over 2,000 Belt Up helmets to grass-roots community cricket clubs across WA. This supports the sport's objective to reduce head injuries on the field through the recent mandatory cricket helmet ruling that now applies to community cricket across the country.

The cost of injuries on the road was almost \$500 million to the Insurance Commission in 2019. Those costs are paid by the two million motorists insured by the Insurance Commission.

INTEGRATED CRICKET LEAGUE

The Insurance Commission is also focused on increasing the independence of people injured on the road and at work. Returning home post-accident and accessing the community are goals that the Insurance Commission supports its claimants to achieve.

People with disability may face barriers in certain environments that prevent their inclusion in an activity. The Integrated Cricket League is an inclusive competition that modifies the game format and environment to provide opportunities for people with disability. There are 16 teams with up to 150 players playing cricket in the community every week. The Insurance Commission supports the Integrated Cricket League as part of the Belt Up campaign to encourage participation for people with disability.

The Insurance Commission has provided the Integrated Cricket League with independence-enabling Belt Up kits including visual aids, helmets, and customised bats and balls to boost participation for the modified game format.

The inclusive sporting opportunities that are provided to people with disability through the Integrated Cricket League contribute to enabling independence and improving quality of life, which is a core focus for the Insurance Commission and its claimants.





growth of 56%. The Perth Scorchers Womens League, a community club-based competition, has been a major catalyst for the growth in metropolitan Perth, as well as strong participation in new women's competitions in regional WA.

Leading this change is local cricket club Ascot Eagles who offer a female pathway from Cricket Blast through to the PSWL. The club has established close relationships with its local Premier Cricket club to maximise opportunities for every woman and girl who wants to play cricket in their community.

ABORIGINAL CRICKET

The National Indigenous Cricket Championships (NICC) saw the Western Australian women's side make it through to the semi-finals and the men to the Elimination Final. However, both games were washed out, unfortunately resulting in the two teams not progressing.

The WA Women's team was awarded the Spirit of Cricket award for outstanding sportsmanship throughout the Championships.

Three WA players were named in the Black Cap national teams following their impressive performances. Regina Deleeuw and Kavita Pepper made the women's squad and Nick Taylor was selected for the men's side.

The Deadly Cricket program has been implemented in some key regional locations with plans for greater roll out in the coming season. Over 300 Aboriginal kids participated across eight locations, with approximately a third of the participants being female.

CRICKET IN SCHOOLS

A number of school programs were successfully delivered by the WACA throughout the State, with more than 158,000 participants equating to a 26.8% increase on the previous season. Unfortunately, the Graeme Wood Shield (34 teams) and Kim Hughes (10 teams) were unable to be completed due to the impact of the Coronavirus pandemic.

The success of a girls' school pilot competition last season prompted a trial girls' school gala day this year. The gala day leveraged off the momentum of the ICC Women's T20 World Cup, with a view to increasing uptake in the Perth Scorchers High School Girls Competition.

JUNIOR CRICKET PATHWAY

The Woolworths Cricket Blast entry-level program saw a growth in both Junior Blaster and Master Blaster numbers. Once again, school holiday programs were delivered over the summer, with a central WACA program very well received.

The 2020 ICC Women's T20 World Cup gave additional opportunities for our Woolworths Cricket Blast participants to experience Good for Cricket Clinics with international players, as well as on-ground experiences on match days across all international, WBBL and BBL matches.

COUNTRY CRICKET

This year saw another outstanding performance from the Men's Country XI team at the Toyota Australian Country Cricket Championships (ACCC) in Toowoomba with the side making the final. Beven Bennell broke the championship run-scoring record, compiling 574 runs at an impressive 63.78 that included a top score of 110.



New Cricket Blast centres were established for the first time in several remote towns including Mount Magnet, Mullewa and Useless Loop.

Female competitions continue to flourish in the South West and Pilbara and a new five-team club competition started in Geraldton for the first time. Establishing a junior girls' competition in each country region remains the biggest opportunity moving into next season.

MULTICULTURAL CRICKET

WA continued to show what a diverse sport cricket is with over 30% of registered players identifying as being culturally and linguistically diverse. This representation is consistent across entry-level programs, junior cricket and senior cricket, as well as school programs. This season also saw the introduction of the Culture Cup Representative team joining the Statewide T20 Cup. The best players and most exciting talent from multicultural competitions were picked to undergo training and development, before making their debut in the Statewide T20 Cup, played at the WACA Ground.

DISABILITY CRICKET

The WACA showcased its commitment to inclusion through its award-winning partnership with Inclusion Solutions, an organisation that supports community clubs and organisations to be better connected to, and more inclusive of, their community. Through the partnership, Inclusion Solutions has offered mentoring to clubs and associations and provided formal training and ongoing support to WACA staff and clubs. The success of the partnership has resulted in Cricket Australia replicating this agreement across all Australian Cricket.

This year the Autism Association of WA (AAWA) partnered with the WACA to create a series of resources to help

clubs be more inclusive of people with autism. Training workshops and education packages, as well as the website autismincricket.com.au, were created to house material available to clubs, coaches and parents. The AAWA provided crucial ongoing support to the families, staff and clubs to ensure all had a positive experience. This partnership was recognised by the Disability Support Awards, where it won the Excellence in Innovation Award.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT

Through its partnership with Healthway and Alcohol. Think Again, the WACA engaged the Alcohol and Drug Foundation to onboard country, Cricket West and Premier Cricket clubs in their Good Sports program.

The Good Sports program is designed to drive behavioural change within clubs by putting in place alcohol management practices leading to policy implementation across the three-level Good Sports program.

Healthway, through this partnership, continues to offer incentives to all clubs who successfully complete Level 1 of the Good Sports program. All clubs who have completed at least Level 1 of the program may apply for cash and prize awards under the Alcohol. Think Again Senior Club Program.

Ongoing support was again provided to clubs, particularly in relation to safeguarding kids in cricket.

INDOOR CRICKET

Indoor Cricket continues to be an important format of cricket that has provided new opportunities to play cricket all year round. New cricket programs played in Indoor Cricket centres across the State include the adoption of more centres delivering the Woolworths Cricket Blast program, integrating the Australian Cricket

Junior Formats into junior competitions which has seen an increase in participation and an impressive increase in senior women's competitions.

VETERANS CRICKET

This year was very exciting for WA Veterans Cricket with teams from WA participating successfully in the Over-60s and Over-70s National Championships held in Adelaide and Albury NSW respectively. In addition, an outstanding Over-50s National Championship event was held in WA in November, with 26 state teams participating at venues across the metropolitan area. A dinner for over 400 people was held at Optus Stadium, while a WACA reception and opening event was also held. The Division 1 final was a great game played at the WACA Ground and a very narrow loss saw the Victorians get home over WA by six runs. The Local Organising Committee and a large number of volunteers contributed to the outstanding success of these Championships.

VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION


Various recognition events and activities were held throughout the season as part of the WACA's Volunteer Recognition Program. Key events held this season include:

The outbreak of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic unfortunately resulted in the Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund (ACIF) being frozen before Round 2 of the 2019-20 season could be finalised.

Despite this setback, the WACA and Cricket Australia remain committed to investing in community cricket facilities through the ACIF in 2020-21.

The ACIF is open to all clubs, associations, schools, councils and cricket facility managers and provides funding for community cricket facility projects, with a focus on growing participation and promoting accessibility and inclusivity.

Details regarding the next round of ACIF are currently being finalised. The WACA thanks the WA Cricket community for their patience and understanding during this unprecedented time.

JOHN RUTHERFORD

John Rutherford, Western Australia's first player to be capped as an Australian Test player while playing for his home state, is every bit a sporting hero. The right-handed opening batsman played only one Test against India in Bombay (now known as Mumbai), but that was a remarkable achievement in those days when WA played only half as many matches as the eastern states.

The long-time Merredin resident got his Australian call-up when he was one of the least affected by the gastro infliction infamously known as Delhi belly. He was chosen for the 1956 tour to England, India and Pakistan after he scored 113 in a testimonial match in Sydney. He scored 30 runs in the one Test he played.

Rutherford's selection came in the year WA was granted full participation in the Sheffield Shield competition. He scored

more than three thousand runs at an average of 31.76 from 66 first-class matches, his high score of 167 was one of six centuries he scored for WA.

In 1960 he captained WA to victory against the famous 1960-61 West Indies team. He continued to rack up the runs for WA, but then came his stroke. He returned to the country town of Merredin and taught math and science at the local senior high school and played some local cricket with success.

After a playing career that spanned nearly a decade, Rutherford spent many years coaching juniors in the local Merredin competition, as well as the Country Week cricket team. His influence was profound as he was also an outstanding contributor to the local community, resurrecting the almost defunct Merredin Historical Society and converting the old railway station into a town museum.



MARCUS NORTH

Marcus North has been one of Western Australia's greatest servants. The left-handed batsman has consistently led from the front with his batting and leadership, as well as his at times cheeky off-spin.

He scored a century in his Ashes Test debut, going on to play 21 international matches and notch up five centuries, which included a high score of 128. As a Test bowler, he took 14 wickets for 591 runs, at an average of 42.21, with a best bowling performance of 6-55.

North played for WA from 1998 to 2014, and made nearly 14,000 runs, including a high score of 239 which was one of 21 centuries he scored for the State. He also captained the side in 40 first-class matches over. With Chris Rogers, North holds the first-class and Sheffield Shield partnership records for the third and fourth wickets of 459 and 369 respectively.

Over his impressive domestic career North took a total of 158 wickets, including three five-wicket hauls.

The dual Laurie Sawle medallist was the inaugural Perth Scorchers skipper. He captained the Scorchers in their first ever Big Bash League campaign in season 2011-12, playing a total of 18 matches for the side.

North is now the Director of Cricket at Durham County in the UK, overseeing all cricket activities, recruitment, contracts, players, scouting and developments, which all contribute towards creating a high-performance culture at Durham in the future.



With only 29 inductees across a rich 135-year history, induction into the Gallery of Greats is the highest honour the WACA can bestow upon a person.

DR KAREN READ

1959 | Player, Captain, Coach, Selector and Administrator

The name of Karen Read is etched indelibly in the history of women's cricket in Western Australia. In a distinguished career, Read's gifted and selfless leadership made a significant contribution to the growth and success of the game in WA.

An elegant right-hand bat, penetrating medium pace bowler and athletic fielder, Read led WA to its first-ever Australian Open Age Championship in 1987 and guided WA to two Under 21 championship titles.

Read represented Australia at Test and ODI level, twice captaining Australia's Under 23 and Under 25 teams, and was a member of the victorious Australian team in the 1982

Women's Cricket World Cup. Read was the first woman from WA to captain any Australian cricket team.

Read was co-founder and is a Life Member of the Melville Women's Cricket Club and held the record for most appearances and runs in Western Australian Women's Cricket Association (WAWCA) history, winning numerous batting awards. In 20 years of service Read was a club delegate, committee member and President of the WAWCA. She became a Life Member of the WAWCA in 1996 and the WACA in 2015.

ANTHONY LONGFORD MANN

A leg-spinning allrounder and brilliant fielder, Tony "Rocket" Mann played 76 matches for Western Australia, featuring in seven WA Sheffield Shield winning teams and five domestic One-Day trophies in

a playing career which spanned two decades.

The hard-hitting lower-order bat played four Test matches for Australia against India in 1977-78 and is best known for scoring a Test century that summer as a nightwatchman at the WACA Ground. His fluent 105 set the home side on course to a two-wicket victory.

Mann sits 11th on the list of leading WA first-class wicket-takers with 196 at an average of 33.63, with best figures of 6-94.

Mann also served three premier cricket clubs in Midland-Guildford, University and Mount Lawley, with distinction for almost 30 years, including stints as captain-coach at both the Swans and Hawks.

In 1976-77 Mann won the inaugural Olly Cooley Medal as the best player in the club cricket competition.

He was also involved with the WACA as cricket manager throughout the WA teams' successful era in the 1990s.

An outstanding servant of cricket in WA, Tony was awarded WACA Life Membership in 2009 for his work both on and off the field.

He played a big part in the careers of many WA players, including the likes of Adam Gilchrist and Brad Hogg and was never shy to drive everyone to be better.

Tony passed away in November after a short illness. He leaves his wife, Lyn, two sons Rob and Geoff, and daughter Emma.



ROY CLARENCE WILLIAM WATSON

A gifted dual sportsman who represented the State in cricket and baseball, Roy Watson played seven first-class matches for Western Australia over two seasons from 1957 to 1959.

Remarkably, he began wicket-keeping in the 1956-57 season when an injury to Fremantle's first choice gloveman presented an opportunity.

He was a natural and when the state selectors looked to bolster the middle-order batting in the Sheffield Shield, Roy was handed his first-class debut.

Roy moved to Newcastle for employment following the 1959-60 season, where he remained until his passing in April 2020.

He leaves two sons, Christopher and Peter, and a daughter, Julie.



GRAEME DONALD WATSON

A former right-handed middle-order batter and medium-paced bowler, Graeme Watson played five Tests and two One-Day Internationals for Australia during his 13-year career in topflight cricket.

The allrounder was a trailblazer in Australian cricket and is in the elite group of Aussie sporting legends to have balanced first-class football and cricket careers at the same time.

Western Australia had a ready-made cricketer of quality when Watson arrived in 1971, he came with the experience of five Sheffield Shield seasons with Victoria and had toured internationally with the Australian team.

Disaster nearly came in January 1972 when he was chosen for Australia against the World XI. In the second innings, a 'beamer' from Tony Greig struck him in a nasty blow to the face and he could have died due to the amount of blood he lost.

He is remembered as the first cricketer to represent three states in the Sheffield Shield, playing with Victoria, WA and NSW.

For WA, he averaged 36.05 with the bat across his 25 matches and amassed 1,298 runs to go alongside 59 wickets.

He passed away aged 76 at Burradoo, just south of Bowral.

RHONA GOLDING (NEE CONNAUGHTON)

Rhona Golding was the 38th woman selected to represent Western Australia.

In 1950, 'Roma' was selected for the WA Women's team to play at the Australian Women's Cricket Championships in Adelaide.

At the Championships, Roma took 2-59 for WA against Victoria at Weigall Oval on 24-25 March.

She passed away at Gwelup in May 2020.

GEOFF NORMAN FERNIE

An integral part of the University Cricket Club as wicketkeeper in their dominant years of the 1950s, Geoff compiled 193 dismissals across an eight-season club career.

He was the leading keeper in the competition in 1957-58 and 1958-59 and took part in three premierships while at the club.

He passed away at Albany, aged 85.

ALAN JOHN DOUGAN

A hard working behind-the scenes president of the Fremantle Cricket Club from 1987-88 to 1989-90, Alan passed away in July 2020.

During his tenure, Fremantle won a Sunday League title and were regular contenders near the top of the table for other honours.

JOHN ROBERT BRABY

A former district cricket umpire, John spent 10 seasons in the competition and stood in 114 matches.

For two seasons he was president of the Western Australian Cricket Umpires' Association (WACUA) and was in the chair during their Centenary celebrations.

He also spent a short time in country cricket administration at the WACA.

Financial Summary

Western Australian Cricket Association Limited FINANCIAL SUMMARY

For the year ended 30 June 2020

The WACA was in a fortunate position to complete all cricket games bar the last Sheffield Shield game of the season resulting in revenue not being materially impacted by the COVID-19 global health pandemic which commenced in March 2020. To combat COVID-19 and protect cash reserves into the future the WACA developed a business continuity plan to protect cash reserves, the assets of the WACA and all forms of cricket (grassroots, community cricket, diversity and inclusion programs and elite performance across the State). With strong cash reserves held by the WACA, a strategic, timed and people first approach was taken to reset the business and set up for the challenges that lay ahead with the potential impact of reduced cricket content, the inability to have mass gatherings, the various quarantine laws to enter each state on top of poor global economic conditions.

To protect cash reserves in the last quarter of the financial year the WACA reduced expenditure and ceased cricket programs, while ensuring all employees had security of employment during this period to enable the WACA to grow reserves and battle the pandemic in 2020-21 and beyond.

After a thorough review of the business to combat COVID-19, the WACA made the difficult decision to reduce its cost base by 31% in June 2020. This was needed to protect the WACA and combat the challenges that lay ahead with the unknown impact to revenue streams in the 2020-21 financial year and beyond.

The potential impact to revenue due to COVID-19 in 2020-21 are:

- Reduced Cricket Australia funding by up to 25%;
- The potential changing cricket fixtures (for both International matches and the Big Bash League) due to COVID-19 Government restrictions;

- Estimated lower (with the potential of no) crowd attendance;
- Potential reduction in membership and sponsorship revenue if cricket content is compromised;

Even with the impact of COVID-19 in the 2019-20 financial year, the WACA produced a revenue figure of \$38,567,364. This revenue was up \$990,183 (or 2.6%) on last year and was derived from several different sources, including:

- The WACA Members area at Optus Stadium and the WACA Ground resulted in membership revenue of \$6,118,128 in 2020 (compared to \$6,995,079 in 2019);
- The Big Bash League which generated ticketing, marketing, membership and catering revenue;
- The success of the WACA Ground function and events business growing sales from \$575,936 in FY19 to \$1,316,582 in FY20;

The revenue noted above supported investment in several areas, most notably cricket operations, which incorporates the promotion of cricket at all levels.

The move of cricket to Optus Stadium is an important long-term opportunity to increase the profile of cricket and enable more fans to watch cricket at a bigger modern venue. The seven home Big Bash League games had an average attendance of 26,935 (compared to 30,133 in 2019 and 21,493 in 2018 - the last year at the WACA Ground).

With the move of major matches to Optus Stadium more cricket fans have the opportunity to become a WACA Member. Several different tiers of membership, with different seating options and premium products are available. The membership and guest card numbers this year were 14,597 down on 15,975 last year.

These Members and guests enjoyed the WACA Members Reserve area at Optus Stadium and the WACA Ground with excellent viewing with Member only bars and facilities.

The second Test Match at Optus Stadium was played against New Zealand in extreme heat in December 2019 in front of 64,978 fans. This was a record crowd in Western Australia against New Zealand with only 46,800 attending the Test Match played at the WACA Ground in 1985.

The WACA has its own catering, function and events business to use the WACA Ground to generate revenue for our broader business. This year the WACA Ground generated record sales of \$1,316,582 (up \$740,646 or 129% on last year). This was an outstanding result considering the impact of COVID-19 and the WACA Ground being closed for the last quarter of the financial year and generating no sales in that period.

With the continued investment of cricket in WA, the result was an operating surplus of \$660,590 before depreciation and interest expense and \$250,588 operating surplus after interest and depreciation. This surplus has helped protect cash reserves with a closing cash balance of \$15,465,113 and helps the WACA to combat all the COVID-19 challenges that lay ahead.

The balance sheet remains very strong with no interest-bearing debt.

Cash flows from operations were strong and able to fully fund the capital expenditure incurred.


